From the Pastor

How does a member of St Paul Lutheran become inactive? The simple answer is that he or she stops participating in the life of the congregation. One measure of inactive church membership, according to our constitution, is when they have not received the Sacrament of Holy Communion at least once during a two year period".

Why is Holy Communion so important that the writers of our constitution made it the factor in determining whether or not a person is active or inactive?

The Bible, early church writers, and Martin Luther made it very clear: the Lord's Supper, like the spoken and written Word of God, is the very center of our life together as Christians.

Just as we are born to human parents, so we are born (or "reborn") to God in baptism. Baptism = Birth. Just as humans must be nourished physically by meals to grow and remain healthy, so children of God must be nourished by the Lord's meal: Holy Communion.

The early church moved its weekly worship from the Sabbath (Saturday) to Sunday. Luke writes, "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2). "On the first day of the week, when we were gathered together to break bread..." Acts 20). "Breaking of Bread" is a phrase Luke used for the Lord's Supper.

We read in the 1st century writings that Christians made it a regular, weekly practice to celebrate Communion. And Martin Luther said that in Lutheran churches, Holy Communion "is celebrated every Sunday and on other festivals." And Martin Luther himself celebrated Holy Communion almost every day.

As baptism is our birth as children of God, so Holy Communion is meant to be our regular meal of nourishment. Someone might argue, "If I don't partake often, then it's special when I do." I heard someone make a good reply to that argument: "It's not intended to be special -- it's intended to be routine! Like eating a meal." How



true! The Lord's Supper was given to us as a routine -- not in the sense of "common" or "ordinary"-- but in the sense of regular. Our lives depend upon the Eucharistic meal as much as -- even more than -- upon daily meals.

Do I need Holy Communion to be an active member of Christ's church? It's not simply our constitution that gives the answer! The most important things in life -- breathing, eating, drinking -- are done frequently. Jesus said: "Take and eat...Take and drink". We swallow his life into our life! Let us do this, together, for the life-giving remembrance of our Lord. (Adapted from Casey Zesch)

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES September 11, 2018

The meeting of St. Paul Lutheran Church was called to order by Bill Klaevemann, president. Present for the meeting were Pastor Tim Muehlbrad, Bill Klaevemann, Nicholas Requejo, Beverly Bruns, Calvin Bruns, Kimberly Gaus, Jay Heil, Lois Kelch, Ray Lange, Cathy Moritz, Dorothy Mayfield, and Judy Taylor.

The devotion was given by Judy Taylor.

The minutes of August 9th were approved as written.

REPORTS

Treasurer Calvin reported a balance in the General operating fund of \$149,985.05 and a balance of \$ 11,704.76 in the building fund. Calvin made a motion to accept the treasurer's report; Judy seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Stewardship A blurb concerning stewardship was placed in Sunday, September 9th's bulletin.

Youth The Youth Committee met on August 29th and discussed NALC Convocation in Denver, lesson plans, communication strategies, classrooms and management skills, goals, deadline notifications, and specific guidelines. Their next meeting will be September 26th at 2 PM.

Worship Jay reported that the committee finalized the plans concerning communion which is to offer communion on the first and third Sundays of the month in the Sanctuary and on the second, fourth, and fifth Saturdays of the month in the Chapel. On Festival weekends, Holy Communion will be held at both. Jay made a motion to accept the procedure that the committee proposed. Beverly seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Social Concerns Five people were assisted in August, St. Paul Lutheran Church donated \$1,200 to the Yorktown ISD for supplies, and a Flu Shot Clinic will be set up for October.

Property The property was inspected by a representative from the Insurance Company this past week. Some suggestions were given, but the consensus was that Yorktown was ahead of most churches in safety issues. A program on Active Shooter training will be given later in the fall. It will be held on a Saturday from 1 to 3 and all members of the congregation are invited to attend. Locks will be placed on all air conditioner thermostats, every year the bells are checked for condition (Jay asked to be present during the inspections), exit signs in Sanctuary will be completed by September 12th, flooring in Day Care will be complete soon, had sewer lines fixed at Day Care, and Grass was mowed at cemetery. Jay made a motion to approve the installation of exit signs in the Sanctuary. Kimberly seconded the motion. The motion carried. The Red Cross is having a training session for volunteers for the emergency shelter program on Saturday, September 15th. Depending on the amount of people attending, the location may be changed.

Parish Ed Wal-Mart donated school supplies to the Learning Garden. The learning Garden is donating some of these supplies to the Sunday School program.

C.E.M. See attached sheet. Pastor Tim said the CCAFP program, mentioned in the report, is a good deal, as it will pay for the food served and the cook's salary.

Evangelism/Outreach no report

Christian Life Bunco party on August 19th was a success with approximately 30 in attendance. On September 9th, approximately 117 people attended Rally Day. Hamburgers, corndogs, chips, dips, beans, and pie/cobbler a la mode were served. Games were enjoyed by the children.

Cemetery A packet of all communication with both parties concerning the tree problem, has been turned over to an attorney.

Nicholas Activities included NALC Convocation, Prayer service, helping at Yorktown Library on two occasions, and helping with the Baptist Church lock-in. He is working on plans for a hayride for families.

Pastor Muehlbrad Professional activities during August include 4 worship services, 4 hospital visits, 4 home visits, 6 educational events, 4 Church meetings and events, 1 week of vacation and attendance at the NALC Theological Conference, Mission Festival,

and Convocation in Denver. The Baptism of Bennett Rohan. Services for Alton Jalufka will be held Sunday, September 16th at the Massey Funeral Home.

Old Business covered

New Business

A. Budgets for all departments should be ready by the November meeting, for tweaking. At the December meeting they will be up for approval by the Council, and at the Congregational meeting in January, they will be up for approval by the congregation.

B. Nominating Committee Places for positions on the Council and other offices were discussed.

C. Council Meeting time Ray made a motion to change the regular Council Meeting to the second Tuesday of the month at 7:30 with no refreshments to be served. Jay seconded the motion. The motion carried.

D. Approve disposing of Children's unused pews Beverly made a motion to dispose of the children's pews, which were no longer being used, depending on the number offered by the education department. Jay seconded the motion. The motion carried.

E. Placement of evacuation plan signs Ray made a motion to place evacuation path signs at all exits in the education building. Judy seconded the motion. The motion carried.

F. Ushers Additional ushers may be necessary to ensure security during the Sunday Services.

Adjournment

Ray made a motion to adjourn. The motion, which Jay seconded, carried.

Words of Wellness for October 2018

Who Do We Appreciate?

Every one of us knows someone who could use a little extra love and appreciation right now. For that matter, there isn't a person reading (or writing) this who probably wouldn't mind a little extra love and appreciation as well. We are hard-wired for connection, and while the nature of that connection shifts throughout the life cycle it is not something we ever outgrow. To paraphrase the Mother Teresa quote above, we have a hunger for love and appreciation that is as strong, if not stronger, than our hunger for food. Just this morning an acquaintance of mine was sharing how whenever he posts something on Facebook he loves checking back throughout the day to see how many "likes" he gets for his post. He even confessed that he sometimes feels a bit embarrassed at how much the "likes" mean to him. When I shared with him my thoughts for this week's column, he agreed with my thesis, saying appreciation was certainly very important for his well-being and that the quote from Mother Teresa certainly rang true for him.

In preparation for this column, I have been doing a little experiment over the last few days that has demonstrated for me both the power and the simplicity of offering love and appreciation to others. I have been making an intentional effort to share words of kindness and appreciation with everyone I encounter—family, friends,

coworkers, neighbors, clerks, baristas, and customer service representatives. What has this cost me? Nothing. What have the effects of this been? Amazing.

Each of us has the power to make someone's day, by simply saying something as simple as, "I really appreciate all the little things you do. I apologize that sometimes take those things for granted, forgetting to let you know how grateful I am for what you do."

The dictionary points out that appreciate has four separate, but related definitions, which all apply to what happens when we show someone how much we appreciate them.

Appreciate:

- 1. To be grateful or thankful for: *they appreciated their thoughtfulness.***
- 2. To value or regard highly: *to appreciate a work of art.***
- 3. To be fully conscious of; be aware of: *to appreciate the hard work involved.***
- 4. To raise in value: *the property's value is appreciating.***

As you have been reading this column, several people may have come to mind, people to whom you would like to offer more of your love and appreciation. If not, please stop now and create a list in your mind.

I would like to invite us all to add one other group of people to our lists. November 11 is Veterans Day and so it is a good time to stop and show our appreciation to any of the twenty-million veterans in our county that we know personally. When we do this, we will help them see how thankful we are for their service and sacrifice, and that we do not take what they have done for granted.

I invite you also to try your own personal experiment of offering thoughtful appreciation to the people you encounter throughout your day. See for yourself, what a difference it makes, both in their lives, and in yours.





Ministry:

I just wanted to share a little about how much good The Learning Garden is doing with sharing the word of God! Since I became Director I have watched our center grow into something amazing. Some of you have asked me what my favorite experience is while I have worked here and well I could speak about how we have become a Texas Rising Star Center, a Texas School Ready Center, we teach Frog Street Curriculum, etc., which don't get me wrong those are all great. However, my favorite experience comes from a parent of a child that we had a few years ago. This Mom came into my office and started to tear up. In my head I was starting to panic and the thoughts that were going through my head were all over the place. She sits down and starts to tell me how grateful she was for our center. Over the weekend her son would not stop talking about the bible story that he had learned that week and how they prayed more than they ever had in their house in a long time. He would not let them eat until they said the prayer we say before we eat our meals. They did not know the prayer that we say before we eat here at the center, so he taught it to them. Then he wouldn't let anyone go to sleep until they said The Lord's Prayer. I was so happy to hear this and it made me start to tear up. The mom told me that they don't go to Church and that she is blessed that her son was learning so much about God and learning how to pray here at the center. The bible that we gave him for Christmas that year, he asks them to read to him every night before bedtime. I was so moved and so happy to hear her story. That experience really showed me how we impact the children and their families by including Bible Lessons every day! It is a true blessing to all of us!
